Local BBQ joint, coffee shop work together

While her restaurant Smo-Qued BBQ was still under construction and without power, Kristen Goolsby spent a lot of time next door at Kaffeine Coffee Shop & Roastery.

"Steve and Debbie are great," said Goolsby, who opened SmoQued in Burdette Central off East Curtis Street in July. "They let me do my work on my laptop, and I would help them with taking coffee and pastries to tables when they were busy."

A Florida native, Goolsby began working at Upstate restaurants for the flexible hours while she attended school full-time to be an

educator. After climbing her way up the management ladder in various establishments, Goolsby began looking for a better opportunity and happened upon SmoQued, where she is an operating partner.

"SmoQued is not your typical Southern barbecue joint," Goolsby said. "We barbecue our food with beer, so it's more like Texas style."

The type of barbecue that SmoQued makes is not the only element that separates it from other barbecue restaurants. SmoQued utilizes electric smokers, which greatly cut down on the amount of wood the restaurant burns, resulting in a more eco-friendly operation.

Goolsby said the restaurant is not going for any specific design but is "laid back."



"We're going for that hole-in-the-wall bbq place," Goolsby said. "Producing good quality food while maintaining eco-friendly products is our main focus."

To achieve good quality barbecue, Goolsby did some research by watching "a lot" of YouTube videos, looking for a rub flavor for brisket that would meet her standards. Goolsby wanted to provide customers with a flavorful rub like no other in the Upstate. (continued on page 2)

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"I really wanted something different," Goolsby said, referring to the traditional rub spices of cumin, cinammon, pepper and salt. "I happened to come across a video on YouTube ... and the guy was using espresso, and I thought, 'Well let me try that.'"

Goolsby's first try was "horrible," she said, but after another try or two, she landed on SmoQued's espresso-flavored rub.

"So far, it's been received well," she said.

That's where Kaffeine Coffee Shop & Roastery comes into the picture. Steve Goss suggested to Goolsby that she use the espresso from Kaffeine for her brisket rub.

A really good cup of coffee

The idea for Kaffeine Coffee Shop & Roastery started years ago when Debbie bought Steve a roaster for Christmas.

"We were looking for a really good cup of coffee and found a place that roasted coffee but was a little bit far from our house," Debbie said.



After Debbie bought Steve the roaster, the two started roasting their own beans.

"We'd have family and friends over, and they kept saying, 'You guys gotta' sell this,'" Debbie said. "That eventually turned into Kaffeine," which opened on East Curtis Street in September 2019.

Like a true friend and neighbor, Goolsby returned the favor to Kaffeine by providing the coffee shop with her homemade honey for the shop's honey lattes.

"We have a couple of people, regulars, who come in here almost everyday for a honey latte," Steve said.

Goolsby, Steve and Debbie all agree that partnerships like the one between Kaffeine and Smo-Qued are good for the local economy. Goolsby said making "long-lasting relationships with neighbors" helps everyone.

"It's just beneficial in the long run to promote local businesses because doing so ... helps the local economy," Goolsby said.

Debbie said a downtown like Simpsonville's needs a "certain sense of camaraderie" for small businesses to survive.

"It's an old-time downtown feel here," Debbie said. "It's like a Simpsonville family."

LEAF PICKUP BEGINS IN OCTOBER

Leaves cannot obstruct traffic and must be placed at least 5 feet from objects such as cars, fences, mailboxes and shurbs. Leaves cannot be mixed with other yard waste, such as grass or hedge clippings.

107-foot ladder truck joins Simpsonville fire fleet

When the City of Simpsonville received a brand new ladder truck in June, firefighters had to get up to speed on its technology.

Simpsonville Fire Chief Wesley Williams said the new truck is "one of a kind" among the 12 other engines and trucks due to its 107-foot long ladder and onboard technology.

"The new ladder truck is an addition to the Simpsonville Fire Department that will further assist our fire-fighters and first responders in keeping residents and visitors safe," Chief Williams said.

In addition to the new 107-foot ladder truck, firefighting apparatus for the SFD include seven engines, a second ladder truck, one aerial platform truck, one hazardous materials truck, one heavy rescue truck and one brush truck.
